Update from Mutford Parish Council

Mutford Parish Council held an extraordinary meeting in January to discuss the next precept - the portion of the Council Tax that is paid by householders as a contribution to the work of the Parish Council.

After lengthy discussion, it was decided to approve an annual increase equivalent to £8.10 per year for a home in band D (the average valuation), which equates to an extra 15.6 pence per week per Band D household.

The precept covers the basic costs of the work of the Parish Council, including the Parish Clerk's salary, the maintenance of the playground behind the Village Hall, the printing of this newsletter and the cost of running the vehicle activated speed sign near the crossroads on Hulver Road.

The village has very few amenities; the playground is a much-valued asset which requires ongoing maintenance and periodic significant spend on replacing all or part of the equipment, bark and fencing to ensure the safety of all users.

The Parish Council is very conscious that some families are enduring financial challenges just now, and we thought very hard about any increase in the precept that we ask parishioners to pay, but this increase will enable the Parish Council to meet these essential costs to maintain our village amenities.

East Suffolk Council collects the Council Tax for our area, and funds itself, Suffolk County Council, Suffolk Constabulary and Mutford Parish Council. A full Council Tax bill is based on at least 2 adults living in a home; you'll get 25% off your bill if you count as an adult for Council Tax and you live on your own. There are eight World War II pill boxes within a few miles of Mutford, which were part of the Emergency Coastal Defence Battery programme which began in 1940. The pill boxes were manned by volunteer members of the Home Guard armed with anti-tank guns.

The NHS will contact you when it's your turn to have the COVID-19 vaccine. Do not contact the NHS for a vaccination before then. The vaccine is free – if you receive an email or phone call asking for your bank details it is a scam.

You'll need to be registered with a GP surgery in England (to get a vaccine). You can register with a GP if you do not have one.

Primroses have begun to flower, and a few snowdrops have started to show themselves. Spring officially starts 20th March but some plants don't wait for that date.

Mutford Neighbourhood Watch

There are a lot of scams at the moment:

- Telephone scams - calls claiming to be about Test and Trace, or Vaccinations, which ask for bank details. COVID-19 tests, and vaccinations are free. Do not give out any financial info.
- Emails and texts – if you receive an unexpected text or email asking for personal or financial details do not click on the links or attachments, and don't respond to any messages that ask for your personal or financial details. There are fake emails from HMRC offering a tax refund and directing victims to a fake website to harvest their personal and financial details.
- Shopping - fake products are being sold online, offering miracle protection, cures or vaccines for coronavirus. These are all fake.

Key protection advice

- Stop: Taking a moment to think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.
- Challenge: Could it be fake? It's ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.
- Protect: Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen victim to a scam and report it to Action Fraud.
